Barrier Game Guidance

Barrier games are a fun way to develop children's speaking and listening skills. They can also be used to explore positional language.

These barrier games are designed for two players. Each player has a phonics grid sheet. The two players sit opposite each other. A barrier is placed between the two children (such as a book) so they are unable to see the other child's word grid.

- 1. Player A puts a coloured counter on a word on their sheet and then gives a simple, verbal instruction to Player B, for example: Put the counter on the word 'I'.
- 2. Player B listens, and then responds to the instruction.
- 3. The steps are repeated until both players have put all of their counters on the word grid.
- 4. At the end of the game, the barrier is removed and the children compare their pictures.

Instructions could be extended for children to listen to the colour of a counter that they need to place on the correct word e.g. Place a red counter on the word 'I'.
